




David & Rob Heading farming at Second Bridge Farm Thorney.

We grow Group 1 Milling wheats Skyfall and Crusoe for Warburtons and Sainsbury's in-house bakeries.





Growing wheat and sugar beet.


Conserving farmland birds through Environmental Stewardship, 33 Species of bird identified in 2015.


Incorporating Moor Farm Shop and Moor Farm Educational Visit Centre.

We have a mixed arable and livestock farm of 600 acres. We grow wheat, barley, sugarbeet, oilseed rape, mustard, beans, peas, potatoes and grass for the single suckler beef herd and a flock of sheep. Our farm shop sells all our own beef and lamb plus we make pork products from Lincolnshire quality assured pork. We contract-farm for 3 neighbours too and offer services such as our revolutionary Strip Cat and Weaving seed drills.

Educational visits

A warm welcome awaits you here at Moor Farm. We offer you an interesting and educational visit to a working farm, in a safe environment.

We host 100 educational visits to schools and groups under the ELS /HLS each year and we have Learning Outside the Classroom (LOtC) quality assurance and are members of FACE. We have free range chickens, ducks and geese that roam around the farm. Our cows calve in the autumn, so the calves are attractive from September to December. We have a flock of 100 sheep which lamb around Easter, so that's a good time to visit to see new born lambs.





D.P. & I.A. Coles farm at Rose Farm Thorney growing wheat, oilseed rape, beans and sugar beet.

Cows graze on the Whittlesea Wash and about 50 beef cattle are sold for beef each year. The farm has been monitored every 4 years by the R.S.P.B since the year 2000, to see what species of birds live on the farm and to date over 44 different species have ben recorded . We consider one of the most important facts of farming in the Thorney area is the drainage of the land and how fortunate we are to have the North Level Drainage Board to do this so efficiently.
